What is a Mentor?

A mentor is a volunteer that works to provide a young person with a special, encouraging relationship that will hopefully become a foundation for success in a child's life. Through this relationship, a mentor attempts to foster the child's self-worth, motivation, coping skills, and strength of character. Put very simply, a mentor lends a child friendly support and a listening ear. This can be done by just talking to the child, reading a book to or with the child, playing a game, or doing an art activity. This gives children a chance to experience some success in a caring environment removed from the regular classroom setting. Mentoring is a unique way that you can help children and give back to your community. One person can MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

What Does A Mentor Do?

Be an effective listener.

In many cases, the mentor is the only person that the student has identified as one who will listen to his/her concerns and problems.

Help the student set short and long term goals.

Convey the idea to the student that if he fails to plan, he plans to fail.

Help the student identify the positive things in his/her life.

For example, what he likes about himself or what things he can do well. Concentrate on his strengths and use them as a framework for helping the student overcome his weakness.

Give them hope and empowerment.

Convey to the student that there is always "hope" that his situation can be turned around, but that "hope" depends, to a large extent, on him.

• Put the shoe on the other foot.

For example, place the student in the position of teacher, parent, and so on when dealing with the student's problem.

• Get involved with the student.

Commit 30 minutes per week toward the student's growth and development.

• Be sincere and committed.

A student can sense when you are not being sincere or do not have his/her interests at heart.

Develop a level of trust with the student.

The trust relationship is of the utmost importance if the relationship is to work.

• Be a Role Model.

Be a responsible role model for the student who may not have other role models.

Be punctual.

Always meet the student at the scheduled times or let them know if you cannot be there.
